About the Southern Society for Philosophy and Psychology

The Southern Society for Philosophy and Psychology was founded in 1904. Its stated purpose is to promote philosophy and psychology in the southern section of the United States by facilitating the exchange of ideas among those engaged in these fields of inquiry, by encouraging investigation, by fostering the educational function of philosophy and psychology, and by improving the academic status of these subjects. The office of President of the society alternates each year between a philosopher and a psychologist. The first SSPP President in psychology was James Mark Baldwin, whose term of office ran from 1904-1908. The first SSPP President in philosophy was J. MacBride Sterrett, who served in 1909. The current President is psychologist Michael J. Beran of Georgia State University.

There are two classes of SSPP membership: full members and associate members. Normally, the applicant for full membership will be expected to have the Ph.D. degree and be engaged in professional research or teaching. Persons without a Ph.D. degree may be eligible for associate membership with the expectation that they can be advanced to full membership after three years of continued and active teaching or research in philosophy or psychology. Full members who reach retirement are eligible for emeritus dues privileges. If you are attending the 2014 meeting and are not a member of the Society, we would welcome your application.
